


Letter Sounds Treasure Hunt

When we were still at school we learned the sounds: **ch, sh, th, qu**. Go on a hunt around your home to look for things beginning with these sounds. You could make a treasure map to show where you found some of the things! Make a list of all the things you find, by writing the words or drawing a picture. You can add any other words you can think of for these sounds onto your list too.

Shapes

What shapes do you know? Can you remember how many sides an oblong has? Have a go at drawing or making some shapes - you could find something in your home to draw around, you could use junk modelling to make solid (3D) shapes, or you could try using string, sticks, or playdough to make different shapes. Choose your favourite shape to make a poster about - how many sides and corners does it have? You might even want to make a shape monster...



Flapjack

Making a basic flapjack is really simple - all you need is butter, oats and any type of syrup/honey. Here's a recipe you could try at home:

- Mix 250g porridge oats with 150g golden syrup and 100g melted butter.
- Pour into a lined baking tin and bake at 180 degrees for around 20 minutes.



You can also make flapjacks more interesting by adding ingredients such as chocolate chips, berries, banana, nuts, raisins, grated carrot, icing or anything else you fancy!
