A brief note on the shortlisted books:

Can You See Me? - by Libby Scott and Rebecca Westcott. Libby Scott is an autistic 11 year old, who has co-written this novel about an autistic girl starting secondary school.

Anna At War by Helen Peters. About a girl arriving in England on the Kindertransport.

Check Mates by Stewart Foster. About a boy with ADHD and his German granddad who teaches him to play chess.

Malamander by Thomas Taylor. Eerie-on-Sea has a local legend of the Malamander which lives in the sea...

The Middler by Kirsty Applebaum - everyone in the village knows that the war is going on, far away. Eldest children are sent away to the war, but the middlers are less important. Dystopian tale of corruption.

A Pocketful of Stars by Aisha Bushby. Safiya loves video games and, when her mother becomes seriously ill, she finds herself inside her mother's memories of a childhood in Kuwait.
