




Nursery: Learning at Home

Could you make a book about three different sea creatures for me?

You could draw them or cut out a picture of them from a magazine or the internet. Remember to cut the pictures out yourself! Do your sea animals have tails, teeth or something else? What colours are they? Could you try to write the name of the sea creature by thinking of the sound it begins with. What sounds can you hear in the word 'crab'? Ask somebody to show you the letters you can hear. You could make some marks, or try to copy the letter it begins with, or other letters you can hear. Now, share your book with a family member. Read it to them, or tell them about your sea creatures.

Banana Yogurt Pops!

Have a go at making your very own Frozen banana yogurt pops. If you haven't got a lollipop stick, you could wrap them in foil at the bottom when you're eating them, or chop them up and eat them from a bowl.

- INSTRUCTIONS
- Halve and peel each banana. Insert a popsicle stick into each banana half.
- Dip bananas into yogurt, using a spoon to coat each banana evenly. Let excess yogurt drip off.
- Add sprinkles or topping of your choice.
- Place bananas on a tray or plate covered with baking paper. Freeze until the yogurt has hardened, about 2 hours. (Allow for more time if you would like the banana to be frozen through).
