2. SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT

2.1 NEW INSTRUMENT OF GOVERNMENT (IOG)

2.1.1 The local authority has approved the revised Instrument of Government (IOG) showing a reduction in size from 18 to 16 governors. The final copy of the IOG was circulated on Governor Hub to the GB for information.

2.2 HEADTEACHER'S REPORT (Presentation)

The Head Teacher gave a presentation on *Where is Coleridge as a school* focusing on the aspirations of the school, the purpose of the school and the changes brought about by the pandemic.

Coleridge school is identified as a special unique place and often described by some students as a second home

The Head Teacher spoke about four important factors of development identified which are interconnected and how Coleridge meets this and can continue to develop and improve in these areas to ensure children thrive:

- i. Intrapersonal (develop sense of self)
- ii. Interpersonally (develop and sustain meaningful relationships)
- iii. Societally (Active role in various communities)
- iv. Globally (our place, role and responsibility to our planet.

The school is developing the Caring Coleridge Charter using the school's logo which shows a circle of hands all interlocked together and the colours symbolise the strands of colour of each class. The children have been asked to identify three ways their class is caring to assist with promoting the school's core values of caring, creative and resilience promoted in every child's development. The aim is for the children and the staff to revisit this activity, as they need to do so.

The School Community:

During the first national lock down there was a real sense of a diverse community coming together. The school now has to work at reconnecting the school community, as this has fragmented during the changes during lockdowns. Further work is required to find ways to bring the community back together again so every member of the community feels they have the opportunity to participate and have their say.

The School will thrive globally. Children will learn about the threats in our world: climate crisis; resource depletion; destruction of biodiversity and these subject areas will be linked to the curriculum to support children's learning so they understand the world they live in and can embrace it.

Creativity is one of the core values at Coleridge School and the school is strong in the arts (music, drama, art rooms, and forest school) and creative throughout teaching of all subjects. There are many opportunities for the children and it is important to ensure these opportunities are accessible to every child including pupil premium children.

The staff are teaching a broad and balanced curriculum which includes Maths, English, Science, Design Technology, history, geography, art and design, music, physical education including swimming, computing, Latin (KS2), religious education, personal, social and health education (PSHE).

The Staff team are passionate about becoming an eco-school, and the school has joined the Eco schools project. The school is recruiting an eco-committee made up of adults and children; the eco-committee will conduct an environmental review. It is important to involve as many children as possible to give them real experiences in developing the eco-school.

The Chair on behalf of the GB thanked the Head Teacher for his presentation. The Power Point presentation will be circulated to the GB on Governor Hub.

 contribution from Coleridge voluntary funds. The current budget includes a
 staff pay freeze, and does not incorporate the increased utility bills and
 increased catering costs.
