

It was a tightly won contest with Lula receiving 58.2m votes to Lula's 60.3m.






know as Harry

January, 1692. The Parris household. Betty Parris and her sister, fast asleep, started twitching and bending at supposedly impossible angles. Horrified, the father, Reverend Parris called upon a doctor. The doctor proclaimed that they were bewitched by the devil!

In 1692, their home of Salem was just a small, boring New England town populated by Puritans, with strong beliefs in witchcraft.

Salem's leaders were quite strict, and even the smallest change in behaviour could raise suspicions that they had a witch in their midst, and where there were witches there was the devil himself!

When the community heard about the odd events late the night before, most of them agreed that the two were victims of witchcraft.



When interviewed, the sisters put the blame on three townsfolk. One of them was Tituba, a Native American slave, who worked for the Reverend.



The other two, Sarah Good and Sarah Osbourne, weren't liked by the Puritans either. The three women were thrown in jail awaiting the trial. On the day of the trial, Tituba, when asked, said that she had seen the one and only, He-whose-name-we-donot-say, The Devil! She also said there was a coven of witches in Salem. The others, Sarah Good and Sarah Osbourne, said they were innocent. But, as it goes, they all pleaded guilty and were hanged.

As the days passed, more and more young girls said they had been possessed by witches and accused local townspeople. Some of the alleged witches on trial even accused other people of witchcraft!

Women weren't the only ones accused of being witches; men and children were being put on trial as well!

When the trials stopped in 1693, 24 people had died, mostly by hanging.

There are lots of interesting and colourful species of birds to be found in wild in the UK. Why not get yourself a bird book and see how many you can spot on your next trip to the outdoors?



The woods aren't just for sensible treks with your family, there are also lots of games to be found if you look carefully



You need to be very careful though.


Here are some tips to keep safe when cooking in the outdoors:

The capital of California is Sacramento.



How well do you know Grouch End?

Our local correspondent, Sadie Gryn explores the history of our area and lays down the challenge for you to find out more...

Crouch End is part of my daily life. I go to clubs there after school, go shopping, get my haircut and much more. I know that a lot of people live there and have spent most of their whole childhood in Crouch End. Even though I don't live there, I LOVE it. Through the research I've done, I know that a lot of kids and grown ups love it too. This article will help you understand why.

How Did Crouch End Get Its Name?
The name comes from the Latin, crux, which means 'cross' and there used to be a wooden cross where the clock tower now stands. It was a rural area until the 1880s when the arrival of railway stations on Crouch Hill and Crouch End Hill meant many more people wanted to live and work in the area.



The Clock Tower

The red-bricked Clock Tower has become a much-loved landmark of Crouch End. Designed by architect Frederick Knight, it was built in 1895 as a memorial to Henry Reader Williams. Williams was Chairman of the local authority of Hornsey and played a major part in shaping the district, campaigning against developers for the preservation of Highgate Wood and Queens Wood.

The Life and Times of Frida Kano


Frida Kahlo was a famous Mexican painter. She was born on July 6, 1907 in Coyoacan, Mexico City, Mexico. She was a feminist and is still an incredible insparation for me and many other children today. In this article, I will be taking you through the life of the incredible artist, Frida Kahlo.

Family Life and Childhood

Frida Kahlo had a large family including two older sisters, one brother and her parents. Her father was a German photographer and her mother was a Spanish housewife. Frida Kahlo had poor health in her childhood. She contracted polio at the age of 6 and was to be bedridden for nine months. Her childhood was not the best; Frida Kahlo was born after her mother lost a son. Depressed, her mother gave her to a nanny. However, the struggles Frida had at a very young age did not hold her back from the greatness she achieved.

A Life Changing Moment

On September 17, 1925, Frida was involved in a serious accident, which left her with a broken spinal column, a broken collarbone, broken ribs, a broken pelvis, and 11 fractures in her right leg.



A pole went through one side of her hip and came out the other side(gross, I know.) Her friend, Alex was said to have been with her in the crash. Her father, an artist, lent her his oil paints and brushes while her mom commissioned a special easel. This meant that Kahlo could paint in her hospital bed and had a mirror placed in the canopy, enabling Kahlo's self-portraits.

Later Life


Following her divorce, Kahlo moved back to La Casa Azul. She moved away from her smaller paintings and began to work on much larger canvases. In 1940, Kahlo and her husband Diego Rivera remarried and their relationship became less turbulent as Kahlo's health deteriorated.


Our school is already in association with the Food Bank Aid offering food donations regularly. We have decided to give all the money raised from selling this newspaper to the Food Bank Aid. This will allow them to buy more food for disadvantaged families. Coleridge began donating to Food Bank Aid on the 29th of March 2021.

In case you don't know what a food bank is, it's a bit like a supermarket, but everything is free. The Food Bank Aid are a group of very kind volunteers, who collect and distribute food to families who struggle to buy enough food. This may be in part due to the rise in energy bills, mortgage bills and food prices.



Where It All Began

The Food Bank Aid began in Highgate during the covid pandemic by a woman named Naomi, who decided to make use of her garage. Naomi gathered some food and set it all up. In September 2021, Food Bank Aid moved to North Finchley, where they were able to access bigger premises.



How Do They Do It?

Now, you might be wondering, how do these people do all this? Well the answer is quite specific. First, they collect food from a donation point (for example, our school). Then, they drive the food to their hub (located at Great North Leisure Park), where they sort all the food. After this, the food is sent to people's houses. All of this is done in just three days!

Did You Know?

Did you know that there are almost twice the amount of food banks than McDonalds in the UK? There are 2,500 food banks and around 1,400 McDonalds. So far, Food Bank Aid have raised £2.8 million worth of donated goods. Food Bank Aid supports up to 18 food banks, who help 11,000 people of which 3,500 children. They deliver 50 cars full of donations to their food banks each week.

The Intergalactic Unicorn.



You should check your home and remove brush, rock piles, junk, cluttered firewood, and any possible rodent food supplies—you should also try not to visit 14th century England!




