Life of Anne Frank

You've all heard of World War 2, right? Well someone has a diary that brings the story to life. The diary belonged to Annelis Marie Frank or, as known to her friends, Anne.



Anne was born in Germany on the 12th of June 1929. The repercussions of the crisis in the USA were bankrupting people everywhere. Anne Frank's dad, Otto Frank, moved the family to Amsterdam at the young age of 4. When WW2 broke out, the family became worried, as a country bordering Germany. And, sure enough, on the 17th of May 1940, The Nazis invaded The Netherlands. Jewish shops closed, including Otto's. But then, danger struck.

Margot, Anne's sister, and the rest of the family went into hiding at the annex at 263 Prinsengracht, Amsterdam. Life in the annex was hard, but safe. They had set times for lunch, dinner and breakfast. In between those, they needed to be silent, as the workers downstairs would hear them.

Then- on her 13th birthday- she got a tartan diary as a present. She loved it and named it Kitty! Anne started writing about everything- life in the annex, food, her fears- everything!

But- the inevitable happened. On the 4th of January 1944, someone tipped off the Nazis that people were hiding at 263 Prinsengracht. Karl Silberbauer led the raid, alongside Dutch officers Gezinus Gringhuis and Willem Grootendorst. They sent the 8 to Westerbork- a concentration camp (a camp that held people captive) in Holland. Later, they were sent to Auschwitz, another concentration camp, and men and women were split up. Eventually, Anne and Margot were split up from Edith and sent to Bergen-Belsen, on a packed train. The camp was cold, wet and there was barely any food.

Anne and Margot, sadly, both died in February 1945, a few months before the end of WWII. They died of a disease called typhus. But, thankfully, we have remembered them well.

Interview with a Striking Teacher

This interview was taken on 26th January 2023, before any of the strikes in England began.

K&H: What do you think about the strikes?

Mr G: They are unfortunate but necessary.

K&H: Why are you going on strike?

Mr G: I believe that schools should receive the proper funding from the government and teachers should be paid a better wage.

K&H: What are the strikes for?

Mr G: Teachers want a pay rise in line with the increase in the cost of living, but they also want this to be funded by the government increasing schools budgets

and not just taking money from schools.

K&H: Do you think the government will give you what you want?

Mr G: I hope so. They've started to show that they will listen and the teachers union is the largest union to go on strike so far, so hopefully we have an impact.

K&H: What happens if the government agree, but do not fund the pay rise with an increase in budget?

Mr G: I would hope that the union would deem this as unacceptable and continue industrial action (going on strike).

K&H: What will you do on the day of the strikes?

Mr G: There is a big march that I and other striking teachers will be going on in central London. We may also have a picket in front of the school, which means we will have teachers giving out leaflets with information on the strikes to people walking by.

K&H: Do you think there will be any more strikes this year?

Mr G: I hope not, but if the government doesn't listen to us, I can imagine that there will be.

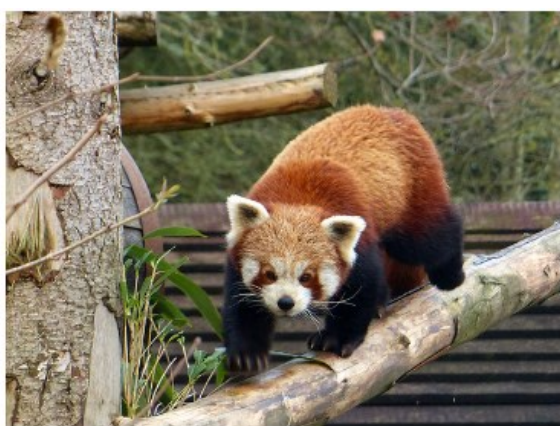
What should I do?

Red Pandas

Now, we've all seen the movie *Turning red* (2022) (I hope), but these are REAL red pandas!



The red panda spends 90% of their time in the trees of the high-rise mountains of Nepal, Myanmar and central China. But, sadly, these miracle mammals are endangered. The forests where they live are being chopped down, and poachers hunt for their luscious, red fur.

AWESOME ANKLES!

When red pandas *do* actually scamper down to the ground, they rotate their ankles 180 degrees to make it easier to grip.

They still look pretty cool, don't they? Red pandas (*ailurus fulgens*) are very agile. They weigh in at 3-7 kg and they live for about 8-10 years. Despite the name, scientists say that red pandas are probably more closely related to raccoons and skunks rather than the other species of panda. Moreover, most pandas spend their time on the ground looking for food.

Lucky for the pandas, though, people are trying to help. For example, the Red Panda Network hires people to be Forest Guardians, which, honestly, sounds pretty awesome!

Cameramen and camerawomen film all sorts of things. Now is your chance to find out everything you need to know about a cameraman.

WHO DO THEY FILM? “**So many different actors! But it depends on the programme, so almost anyone.**”

WHY DO THEY CHOOSE THE JOB? “**Not sure, but it was something I wanted to do when I was in my mid-teens.**”

WHAT DO THEY FILM? “**Almost anything!**” Examples: animals, vets, buildings, nature, people, cars and more!

WHEN DO THEY FILM? “**Camera people can work between any span of days or weeks. Some can work for more than 6 weeks.**”

WHERE DO THEY FILM? “**Cameramen or Camerawomen film absolutely anywhere to film anything. They film from European countries to tropical rainforests in South America.**”

A cameraman/camerawoman are people who film important videos, tv series, films, time lapses and more. The camera operator's job is to operate the camera and maintain composition and camera angles throughout a given scene or shot. Camera operators film so many things such as movies, TV programmes, series of episodes. My dad even filmed the formula 1 racing car once!

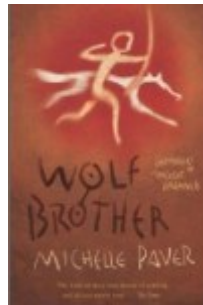

Lorak is alone, wounded, terrified and on the run. His father lies dead, slaughtered by a demon bear. His only ally is an orphaned wolf cub.



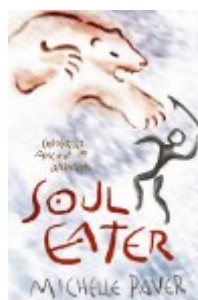
Spirit Walker

Soul Eater

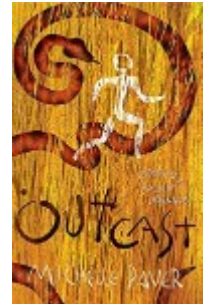
In the dead of winter, Torak's pack-brother, Wolf, is captured by an unknown foe. Desperate to rescue him, Torak and Renn must brave

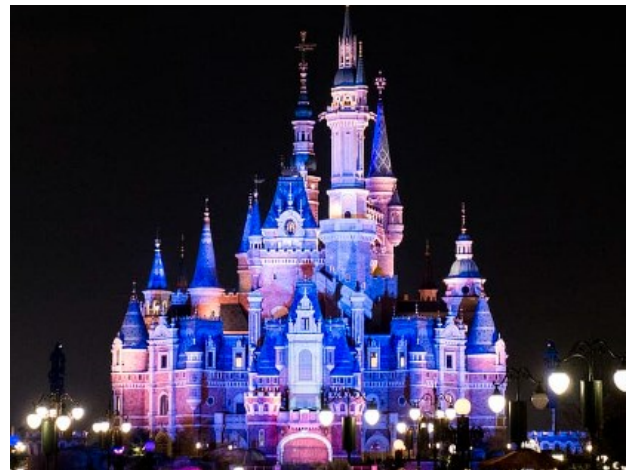

This Month In History: March

11th March 1864

Tonight in 1864 disaster struck Victorian Britain. A strong South Westerly gale lashed the surface of the Dale Dyke reservoir outside Sheffield. Great waves crashed against the dam that had only just been completed!

The nervous engineer John Gunson stayed up to check whether his dam would hold, and what he saw sent a chill through him...

A large crack was opening in the face of the dam. Water was gushing through! 250 people and 700 animals sadly drowned. 15 bridges swept away. Hundreds of buildings were also destroyed or damaged.

It was Victorian Britain's worst non-maritime, civilian loss of life.

Naturally it became a huge tourist attraction. Visitors came to see the aftermath, and many contributed to a rebuild fund. £42, 000 was raised. Even Queen Victoria sent £200.

12th March 1881

It was a significant milestone. Today in 1881, Andrew Watson become the first black footballer to play in and captain an international team. He lead Scotland to a comprehensive 5-1 win against

England - a margin of victory not then unusual, dominant as the Scottish team was. A mural depicting Watson has been painted outside a Glasgow cafe.

The mural was one of many in a series supporting the Black Lives Matter movement, reminding people about important black figures in Scottish life.



15th March 44 BCE

On this day in 44 BCE Julius Caesar had been tempted to skip the meeting of the senate taking place on the Ides of March. His wife had been having nightmares and begged him not to attend. Caesar's friends had also heard worrying rumours, but Caesar's old friend Marcus Brutus had encouraged him to attend.

A group of conspirators who were unhappy about Caesar's title of 'dictator for life' had decided to act. Tilius Cimber tore at Caesar's toga. Servilius Casca lunged at his neck, and that sparked a frenzy of stabbing from those around him. The dictator had no chance. He died beneath a hail of blows.

31st March 1889

You will definitely all recognise this picture, with the Eiffel Tower being one of the most famous tourist attractions in the whole world. However, when it opened in 1889 amazingly, the breath-taking masterpiece of iron was not an instant hit.

The construction started on the 28th of January 1887. It was built as part of a

festival to mark the 100th anniversary of the start of the French Revolution. The tower was built by Gustave Eiffel. Loved by tourists now, the tower caused much anger at the time, with many worried that other monuments would be overshadowed by the "*hateful shadow of the hateful column of bolted sheet metal*".

Birthstones

You can tell which birthstone you are by finding it in this article.

Garnet

The birthstone for January is a garnet. The spiritual meaning for them are love and friendship. This means that if you were born in January, you are loyal, kind, loving and caring to your friends. (The colour is red.)

Amethyst

If you're born in February, your birthstones are

amethyst. Amethyst is the stone of peace and calming. Some people believe that their presence can give you soothing dreams. (The colour is

violet.)

Aquamarine

Aquamarine is the birthstone of happiness, hope and everlasting youth. You have this birthstone if you were born in March. It's also thought to protect the sea. (These crystals are blue with a bit of green.)

Diamond

Diamonds are the birthstone of April. They symbolise inner strength and better relationships with friends and family. (The colour is usually see through but sometimes blue.)

Emerald

If you were born in May, your birthstones are emeralds. Since they're literally called 'emeralds' it's obvious that they're bright green. They symbolise royalty, wit, eloquence and foresight. (These crystals are green.)

Alexandrite

Alexandrite is the birthstone for June. This means that if you were born in June, you will

most likely be creative, loving and good fortune. (These crystals are often ruby red with an incandescent light.)

Ruby

Rubies are often associated with wealth and prosperity. Lots of crowns are decorated with rubies because they can also represent good fortune and courage. If your birthday is in July, your birthstone is a ruby. (These crystals are red)

Peridot

is in August, your birthstone is a peridot. Peridots represents strength and is sometimes called 'Evening Emeralds' because of its light green colour.

Sapphire

Sapphire is the birthstone for September and represents sincerity, truth, faithfulness and nobility. The most valuable colour of a sapphire is velvety blue and violetish blue. (These gemstone are usually blue but can also come in shades of purple, yellow and green.)

Pink Tourmaline

This pink crystal symbolises love of humanity and humanitarianism. If you were born in August, your birthstone is Pink Tourmaline. It can also mean gentleness, compassion and joy as well. It's incredibly rare to find. (Obviously, Pink Tourmaline is pink.)

Topaz

Topaz is the birthstone for November. There are many different colours of Topaz but the yellow ones are known for symbolising friendship like yellow roses. In ancient times, these crystals were associated with wealth, beauty, strength and protection. (These gemstones are often yellow or orange.)

To start this off, Liverpool was established on the 3rd of June 1892 by John Houlding, who established both Liverpool and Everton. Their nickname is "The Reds". They have won a record 9 league cups, 19 league titles, 8 FA cups, 16 FA community shields, 6 European cups, 3 UEFA cups, 4 UEFA super cups, and 1 FIFA club world cup.

Their rivals have always been Manchester United and Everton, and their anthem is the one and only "You'll never walk alone".



Their first game was on the 1st of September 1892 against Rotherham Town, which they won 7-1. They won the Lancashire League in the debut season, and joined the Football League Second Division for the 1893-1894 season. They were then promoted to the First Division in 1896. After Tom Watson was appointed manager, he led the Reds to its first two league titles, one in 1901 and one in 1906. They then played their first FA cup in 1914, losing 1-0 to Burnley. They went on to win two league championships in 1922 and 1923, but didn't win anything until 1947-1948 season, when they won the First Division for the fifth time. They won it again in 1964, just before the Heysel stadium disaster.

The Heysel stadium disaster was tragic; leaving 39 Juventus fans dead in a game versus Juventus away. This is due to Liverpool fans breaching a fence before kick off between the two groups of supporters and charging the Juventus fans. Liverpool and all other English teams were banned from playing in any national competitions for 5 years.

Tragically, this was followed by the Hillsborough disaster in an FA cup semi final against Nottingham Forest, which was caused by hundreds of fans being crushed by perimeter fencing. 94 fans died that day.

Despite the bad days, Liverpool won the 1992 FA cup final and won it again in 2003, and the same in 2006. In the 2008-2009 season, they got a record 86 points and won again, which is not surprising. You'll see why later on. 2015 saw Jurgen Klopp's arrival; our beloved manager. Then in 2020, Liverpool achieved a joint-record 32 wins in a top-flight season. And finally, on the 5th of March 2023, Liverpool beat Manchester United not 1-0, not 2-0, not 3-0, not 4-0, not 5-0, not 6-0 but 7-0! You can probably remember the rivalry between them. They beat them at home, with a few spectacular goals; like Darwin Nunez's header in from a corner and new squad player Cody Gakpo scoring two goals. Mo Salah scored but got a yellow card for taking his shirt off; how annoying! This took Liverpool to 5th; and if Liverpool win their next game they would go to 4th!



Ukraine

Following the one year anniversary of the war between Ukraine and Russia, I thought I would update you on the crisis and include a few interviews with people who are either from Ukraine or have kindly invited Ukrainian refugees to lodge with them.

One of the best ways to find information about Ukraine is by reading a

Ukrainian's own diary such as "You don't know what war is like—a diary of a Ukrainian refugee" by Yeva Skalietska. She wrote this to distract herself from the unsettling noise of gunfire and the sad conversations happening around her. This is just one example; there are loads of other diaries from Ukrainian refugees.

On 24th February 2022, the Russian president, Vladimir Putin, gave orders to his army saying that they should force their way into Ukraine and invade. This has resulted in education being

disrupted for around five million Ukrainian children. Further, nobody knows for sure but it is estimated that around 160,000 Ukrainian Refugees have come to the UK.

One of the most extraordinary things in the UK is how people have opened up their house to Ukrainian refugees. Continue this article to read my exclusive interview with a guest and a host.

Here is my interview with Joseph Brown, who has recently said goodbye to Yulia, who lodged with them for almost a year:

Q. What's the best part of opening your house up to a Ukrainian?

A. You feel good about helping someone in need.

Q. And what's the worst part?

A. There is a whole other person to feed and care for.

Q. How do you feel about the situation in Ukraine?

A. It's so bad words can't explain

Q. What do you think Putin's motive to invade Ukraine is?

A. He wants more land.

Q. Do you think hosting was an overall good experience?

A. Yes I would recommend it.

Q. What would you rate having a Ukrainian out of Six

A. Seven out of six!

This is an interview with Yuliia who is staying in our house and has been living with us for the last 8 months:

Q. How did it feel when you first arrived in our house

A. I felt a little bit worried but also inspired. I was worried because I didn't know how everything would work. But I was really grateful and inspired by the chance for a new start and the possibility to stay safe.



Q. What do you miss most about Ukraine?

A. Despite the fact I really like England and I'm happy here, I really miss all my life in Ukraine. Of course I mostly miss my family and my friends.

Q. What was school like in Ukraine?

A. Hmm. I can say that my school was pretty good. I learnt English at school from my first year. We had sport lessons, art lessons, and I was also an actress in the school theatre. I had etiquette lessons and drama lessons.

Q. What is it like sharing your culture with people in England?

A. It's great! A lot of people are interested in Ukrainian culture. My host family organised a Ukrainian Christmas and we cooked Ukrainian food including a special Christmas dish, Kutya, and I invited my Ukrainian friends. It was very special. I have also bought my host family some books of the Ukrainian alphabet and Ukrainian history.

Q. Who is the leader of Ukraine and how well do you think he is coping in this moment of crisis ?

A. The leader is the President, Zelensky. We also have Mr Zaluzhny (pronounced Zalushny). He is the head of our army and I think he is doing his best. A lot of ordinary people in our country are helping the army - they are all leaders and trying to make sure we get a victory.

Q. How do you find the Crouch End? Is it what you expected?

A. I didn't have any expectations because I hadn't heard of this area. However, I love it - it's perfect. It is quiet in the evenings, safe, and has lots of lovely houses. There are lots of

people smiling, and I'm happy to be living here.

Q. What are your hopes for the future?

A. I really hope to find a job here and become a member of English society. I really love this country. But of course my first hope is the end of the war and peace for Ukraine, and peace for all people. I am looking forward to our victory

Louis Armstrong

Louis Armstrong was one of the finest jazz musicians in the world. His work broke ground for a new style of popular American music.

Louis's childhood

Louis Daniel Armstrong was born on August 4th 1901 in New Orleans, Louisiana, USA. When Louis was still a baby, his father left him with his grandmother. His family lived in a very poor part of town and most people called it The Battlefield .

When Louis was 11 years old (year 6), he was forced to leave school to help put food on the table. That is why Armstrong joined a group who used to busk in the streets for spare pennies. A Jewish family called the Karnofskys took Louis in and gave him jobs to do such as delivering coal. They started to notice how talented Louis was at singing and often, while they were eating, would ask him to sing for them.

Morris Karnofsky bought Louis his first cornet; a cornet is like a stubbier version of a trumpet. Louis also had a separate job selling coal in a part of New Orleans

where there were lots of bars, cafes and pubs. That's where Louis first learnt about jazz music. Louis fell in love with it immediately!

One New Years Night, after he shot a pistol off, he was arrested and sent to New Orleans school for troubled kids. There he learned to play in the school band and because he was good, the music teacher started to give him lots of extra lessons.

FUN FACTS:
His nicknames were Ambassador Satch,Dippermouth, Dipper,Pops and Satchmo all referring to his abnormally wide mouth.

His early Career

In 1914 Louis left home, when he was still only 13 years old (just imagine

leaving school at the end of only year 8!) But Louis was for once just a little bit lucky; he soon got a job entertaining people on various steamboats in the Mississippi rivers.

In 1924 Louis married the pianist Lillian (Lil) Harding who brought out the best of his potential and influenced him in creating his own music.

In 1925, when Armstrong arrived back in Chicago, mostly to the will of his wife, Lil Hardin, he created the Louis Armstrong **Hot Five**, later becoming the **Hot Seven**.

The Louis Armstrong Hot Five made the hit Potato Head Blues. The Louis

Armstrong Hot 5 included Kid Ory, Johnny Dodds, St.Cyr (pronounced Saint See Her), Lil Armstrong, and of course Louis Armstrong!

They were a very chilled out band (influenced by The Man Louis Armstrong) and as St.Cyr once quoted "One felt so relaxed working with him." In 1926 Armstrong and the Hot Five recorded an absolute Smasher - the record-breaker Heebie Jeebies!

Later works

In the 1950s/60s Louis moved away from music solos and into musicals such as Glenn Miller Story, High Society, and his most famous movie, Hello Dolly, which features the song, Hello Dolly. He

also wrote the song 'We Have All The Time In The World', which also featured as the theme in the 1969 James Bond movie.

The civil rights movement

Louis played a major role in the civil rights movement. In 1957 people started to try and desegregate schools in an area of Arkansas called Little Rock. But the governor of Arkansas didn't want black students to challenge white students so he denied nine black students from applying to the main high school in Little Rock. They were nicknamed the Little Rock Nine. They became some of the main figures in the civil rights campaign. Louis gave an interview basically stating that the black Americans had no country and the president was a two faced man with no guts. This outraged the government and people started to boycott his shows. Yet Louis never regretted his words; he even stated "I said what somebody should have stated a long time ago."

The End of his life

Louis sadly died on July 6th 1971. He died from frequent heart and kidney problems.

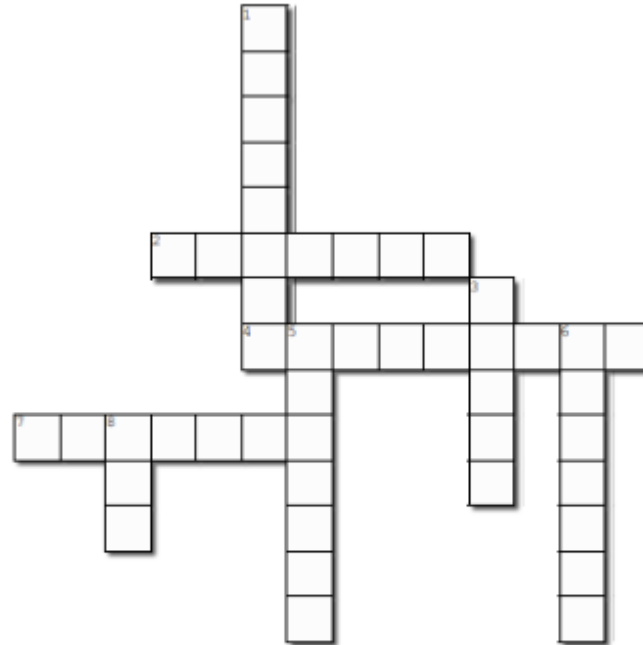
