YEAR 5	<p>The Origins of Language</p> <p>Children will be introduced to Latin and explore its roots and links with the English language. They will look at the grammatical structure of English based on word order and compare this to Latin, which relies on word endings to denote meaning. Children will learn a number of Latin words and identify the roots to modern English.</p> <p>Children will explore classical culture, making links to modern words and cultural references (Greek myths and marvel, Latin names in Harry Potter). Children will learn about the myth of Achilles.</p>	<p>Present Tense Verbs</p> <p>Children will build on their learning in the Autumn term. They will focus on Latin verbs and learn how word endings replace the need for pronouns. They will learn these different verb endings and understand that we need to pay attention to these and not word order. The children will continue to build their Latin vocabulary.</p> <p>Children will learn about Greek mythological creatures, as well as some Greek gods and goddesses, and read the myth of Orpheus.</p>	<p>Verbs and Adverbs</p> <p>Children will consolidate their understanding of Latin verb endings. They will extend this by learning about adverbs and explore their roots to modern English. They will write and speak using verbs and adverbs. The children will continue to build up their knowledge of Latin vocabulary.</p> <p>Children will learn about Roman mosaics, Latin curses and benedictions, and read about the Myth of Midas.</p>
YEAR 6	<p>Subject and Object Nouns</p> <p>Latin in Year 6 begins with a revision of vocabulary and language rules learned in Year 5. Children will then go on to learn about the word endings for nouns, looking at how they vary depending on whether the noun is 'feminine' or 'masculine', the subject or object of the sentence, or singular or plural. The children will continue to build their Latin vocabulary.</p> <p>Children will learn about Roman board games, the Roman army, and the story of Boudica.</p>	<p>Simple Sentences in Latin</p> <p>This term, the children will consolidate and rehearse their learning on verbs, adverbs and nouns to date. They will then go on to learn a structured method of Latin sentence analysis to help them translate longer sentences accurately. They will practice this over a number of lessons.</p> <p>The children will learn about Roman food and recipes and also translate part of one of Aesop's Fables – The Town Mouse and the Country Mouse.</p>	<p>Numbers and 'To be'</p> <p>Children will continue to use the technique they learnt in the last unit to translate longer Latin sentences using a structured approach. They will also learn about the irregular verb 'to be'. Children will continue to build on their vocabulary knowledge, with a particular focus on number words.</p> <p>Children will also translate parts of the myth of Hercules.</p>
