

Year 1 Home Learning

Topic & science

This half term, our topic is geography– **Our World**. We will learn about the countries that make up the United Kingdom and study the countries children feel connected to, either through family, travel or interests.

This half term, our science topic is '**Animals, including Humans**'. We will be learning about how to group animals, e.g. mammals, reptiles etc. as well as learning about the different parts of the human body and what each part does. We will also be observing changes across the seasons, looking at weather forecasts and making weather observations.

Proper Project

Let's think about our links with the world.

With an adult, have a go at thinking about your family tree and look at where in the world you have connections to family or friends. You can then have a go at drawing a map and highlight the connections you have to those places. Work out:

- Are they global? National? Or local?
- Who is there?
- Have you ever visited? How often?
- How far away are they?



Let's talk...

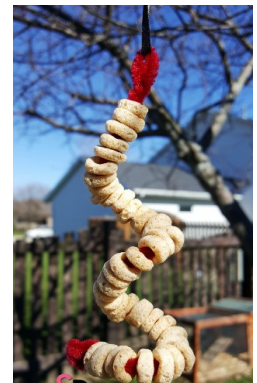

Keep an eye out for birds such as robins, blue tits and sparrows as well as squirrels and foxes. If you spot any wild animals, have a look at what they are doing and where they live.
