Grammar and Punctuation Wodal verbs



Auxiliary verbs are known as helping verbs; they are used with main verbs when something has happened. The auxiliary verbs are **be, do** and **have.**

Modal verbs are auxiliary verbs which are used to express possibility or wanting, as well as the future.

should would could must may might will can

can't ought shall won't

Examples in sentences:

We **must** take him to the vet's. I **ought** to take him to the vet's. I **might** take him to the vet's.

Tenses





Tense is the form taken by a verb to indicate the time of the action. Tenses are used to express different times. An action (or an event) may have taken place in the past or it may take place in the present or future.

Task: Re-write these sentences in the present tense into the past tense and future tense.

The child plays 4-square at breaktime while his friend is taking part in a table tennis tournament.
